The Regular Session of the 88th Legislature marked the first opportunity for Texas lawmakers to pass Pro-Life bills after the historic overturning of *Roe v. Wade*. However, the Texas Legislature neglected preborn children, yet improved protections for vulnerable patients.

No bills passed to stop illegal abortions or fully enforce our Pro-Life laws. The Legislature underfunded pregnancy centers and adoption agencies but provided new help for pregnant and parenting college students. This session's most notable victory was a reform to protect patients facing the anti-Life 10-Day Rule in the Texas Advance Directives Act. While there is still more work to do on this critical Pro-Life issue, this legislation is the most significant improvement in over two decades for patients' rights and medical freedom in Texas.

Representative Caroline Harris authored Pro-Life Priority House Bill 1574, which requires higher education institutions that offer priority registration to provide this accommodation to pregnant and parenting college students. Representative Harris coauthored all the Pro-Life Priority Bills. Coauthorship of a bill is important because it can help legislation move through the process and indicates the elected official's support when that bill doesn't receive a formal vote.
