From the outset of the Regular Session of the 89th Texas Legislature, Texas Right to Life identified two key legislative priorities necessary to combat ongoing threats to Life in the post-Roe era. The first priority, the Woman and Child Protection Act (Senate Bill 2880 and House Bill 5510), addressed the growing problem of abortion pills being shipped into Texas. The second priority, the Stop Tax-Funded Abortion Travel Act (Senate Bill 33 and House Bill 1806), prohibited Texas cities from paying for out-of-state abortion travel. The Legislature successfully passed the Stop Tax-Funded Abortion Travel Act during the Regular Session. Unfortunately, the Woman and Child Protection Act, intended to combat the distribution of abortion pills, died in the House of Representatives, putting more than 19,000 preborn lives at risk each year.

Texas Right to Life formed and led a broad coalition to send a letter to Governor Greg Abbott, urging him to add this issue to the special session agenda. Because of the leadership of the Texas Senate and Governor Abbott, the Woman and Child Protection Act ultimately passed both chambers during the Second Special Session.

In addition, the Legislature passed several meaningful measures championed by Texas Right to Life that further strengthen our culture of Life. These victories include ensuring that families of preborn children diagnosed with life-threatening conditions receive life-affirming information and referrals, promoting education about adoption, and reaffirming protections for pregnant mothers facing medical emergencies. The Legislature also appropriated a record \$200 million to support qualifying pregnancy centers and adoption agencies, while clarifying that these funds must go exclusively to Pro-Life providers.

Representative Cunningham authored Pro-Life legislation House Bill 5114, which would have required continued education for physicians about private and foster care adoption and how to communicate adoption options and information about related resources to their patients. Despite several requests from Texas Right to Life, Representative Cunningham failed to coauthor Pro-Life priority House Bill 5510, which aimed to combat lethal abortion pills in the regular session. Coauthorship is important because it can help a bill move more quickly through the legislative

process and indicates an elected official's support when that bill ultimately does not pass. House Bill 5510 did not pass the House during the regular session.

REGULAR SESSION

Senate Bill 1 by Senator Joan Huffman (R-Houston):

The state's budget for Fiscal Years 2026–2027. The funding goal to meet increasing demands for Pro-Life resources was \$210 million dollars. The House achieved this goal, but the Senate reduced the amount to \$200 million when finalizing the budget.
