From the outset of the Regular Session of the 89th Texas Legislature, Texas Right to Life identified two key legislative priorities necessary to combat ongoing threats to Life in the post-Roe era. The first priority, the Woman and Child Protection Act (Senate Bill 2880 and House Bill 5510), addressed the growing problem of abortion pills being shipped into Texas. The second priority, the Stop Tax-Funded Abortion Travel Act (Senate Bill 33 and House Bill 1806), prohibited Texas cities from paying for out-of-state abortion travel. The Legislature successfully passed the Stop Tax-Funded Abortion Travel Act during the Regular Session. Unfortunately, the Woman and Child Protection Act, intended to combat the distribution of abortion pills, died in the House of Representatives, putting more than 19,000 preborn lives at risk each year.

Texas Right to Life formed and led a broad coalition to send a letter to Governor Greg Abbott, urging him to add this issue to the special session agenda. Because of the leadership of the Texas Senate and Governor Abbott, the Woman and Child Protection Act ultimately passed both chambers during the Second Special Session.

In addition, the Legislature passed several meaningful measures championed by Texas Right to Life that further strengthen our culture of Life. These victories include ensuring that families of preborn children diagnosed with life-threatening conditions receive life-affirming information and referrals, promoting education about adoption, and reaffirming protections for pregnant mothers facing medical emergencies. The Legislature also appropriated a record \$200 million to support qualifying pregnancy centers and adoption agencies, while clarifying that these funds must go exclusively to Pro-Life providers.

Senator Hughes authored Pro-Life priority legislation Senate Bill 2880, the Woman and Child Protection Act, which aimed to combat abortion pills being illegally shipped into Texas. He also advanced the bill through the Senate committee on State Affairs, which he chaired, and through the Senate. When the bill failed to pass during the regular session, Senator Hughes filed it again in the first special session as Senate Bill 6, again advancing it quickly through his committee and the Senate. He filed this Pro-Life priority a third time as Senate Bill 7 in the second special session. Finally, Senator Hughes passed the bill to combat abortion pills as House Bill 7 during the second

special session as its Senate sponsor. Senator Hughes also authored Senate Bill 31, which ensures pregnant women facing miscarriages, ectopic pregnancies, or medical emergencies are treated without delay, including creating a continuing education requirement for doctors and lawyers regarding Pro-Life laws.
